






<u>Our Vision</u>

Responsible citizens






P2 Daily Organisation

We talked about what we needed to do and created our Class Charter from that which we all then signed with our Lego minifigure!


Our Board of Recognition will help us to remember and practise this, and we can add to it when we think we need to.

Home Learning

In P2, your child will experience a variety of home learning experiences. These will be completed on a weekly, termly or ongoing basis throughout the year.

Every week, your child will get a reading book and a Numeracy and Maths challenge posted on Seesaw.

Each term, your child will receive a paper copy of sounds and words to support teaching in Read Write Inc. An IDL (topic) grid will be uploaded to Seesaw. There are 9 activities for the children to choose from. Teachers will the give children time to present their work in class.

Annual resources of spelling activities, reading question and a life skills grid will be uploaded on Seesaw for you to use.

You will also be given a common word spelling booklet and login information for Oxford Owl, Education City and Sumdog.

When using Seesaw, we would like you to log in as a family member.

If you have more than one child using Seesaw this will also allow you to switch between accounts.

Please let us know if you would like us to re-issue your family login information.

All children in P1 -3 have access to their own iPad. All children in P4 - 7 have access to their own chromebook. This term we will have a focus on safe and responsible use of devices. Device will not be sent home until after the September weekend and only once Class Teachers feel children have a clear understanding of acceptable use of devices.





Learning through and with digital technology

This is how we stay safe when we use devices:


- ★ I will ask a grown up if I want to use my device
- ★ I will follow instructions when I use my device
- ★ I will take care of my device and other equipment
- ★ I will ask for help if I am not sure what to do
- ★ I will tell a trusted adult if I see something that upsets me on the screen

Devices will be sent home after the September weekend when the children have the skills required to use them and that all software updates have been completed.

Digital Support for Parents, Carers and Pupils



Digital Inclusion and Learning Team Device Repair/Replace Policy

Damage to devices must be reported immediately to Sandra Scanlon, Mrs Knight or Mr Smith.

Pupils are responsible for

Keeping the device in its case

Not putting stickers or labels on the inside of chromebooks- this can damage the screen

Keeping the device away from water bottles and fluids at all times

Transporting the device safely and sensition to school each day

Charging the device

Shutting down the device properly

Following all advice in the <u>Pupil Support</u> <u>Guides</u>

Replacement devices (like-for-like) are supplied when:

- A device is faulty and the Troubleshooting Guide cannot resolve the fault
- Accidental damage occurs- reason for damage is required

Replacement devices **(non like-for-like)*** are supplied when:

- Malicious damage occurs
- Repeated irresponsible use occurs
 *typically older non-touch, non-flip models of device

Replacement devices not routinely supplied when:

- Keys have been picked off or removed- user should use onscreen keyboard
- Headphone jacks have been snapped in the device



NCCT

NCCT stands for Non Class Contact Time. Teachers use this time out of class to plan and prepare learning. When teachers have NCCT the class is taught by another member of teaching staff.

Mrs Kirkland is in P2A on Wednesday morning and in P2B in the afternoon supporting a range of topics.

Mrs Marrins is in P2 classes on Wednesday afternoon for P.E. with both classes.







Literacy in P2

- Reading workshops will develop higher order thinking skills.
- Small group reading will be used to develop fluency and expression.
- Class novels and picture books developing love of reading, vocabulary, remembering and prediction skills.
- Drawing club to develop creativity and imagination while expanding vocabulary.
- Children will have opportunities to write extended pieces of writing through our Talk for Writing programme.
 - Opportunities to explore literacy within our play environment.





Phonics and Reading are taught through the systematic teaching of synthetic phonics. We use the Read Write Inc. (RWI) programme to achieve this.

Each child is assessed and placed into a RWI group based their phonics sound knowledge and reading skills. Children work with a group based on their ability to ensure progress and confidence in their reading skills. Groups are assessed every 6-7 weeks and children are moved accordingly to either accelerate progress or provide further consolidation.

To begin, children are taught the early sounds in Set 1. This covers the alphabet sounds and a few 'special friends' when 2 letters make 1 sound e.g. 'sh'. Once confident, the programme moves to Set 2 sounds and then Set 3 sounds, which introduce alternative spellings for sounds they know.

Children learn to blend sounds together so c-a-t becomes cat. The green frog Fred helps us do this. Using 'Fred Talk', 'Fred Fingers' and 'Fred in your Head' help us become confident and fluent readers and writers.

Words which we can decode are called <u>green words</u> and words which don't follow the rules and are 'tricky' are <u>red words</u>. We use 'alien' words to help children apply and consolidate their sound knowledge in nonsense words.



When your child is 'off the programme' the learning doesn't stop!

Children will follow the Midlothian progressions for Reading where the focus is on the skills needed for reading. These include phonics, fluency, comprehension and vocabulary.

Children will continue to consolidate their phonetic knowledge and begin to learn more complex spelling patterns. There will be many opportunities for children to be able to apply their spelling knowledge in different contexts.

Children will engage with a variety of different texts including short novels, extracts from texts and online texts. Here they will make predictions, answer and create questions, learn to summarise and make connections with their own lives and in the world around us.



Home learning and Reading

Your child will bring a book home to share. Books will come home on a Monday and be returned the next Monday. Your child will be able to choose from a range of books to bring home.

When reading, encourage your child to sound out words they don't know. Help them if they get stuck and praise them when they succeed.

The book might be one you have had home already or that you think might be too easy. Our focus with reading at home is to build confidence, fluency and expression. Encourage your child to read the book more than once in the week. This helps them apply these skills more accurately. Talk about the book and pictures. Ask questions about the book and encourage the children to ask their own questions too.

If the book is too difficult, you can read it to your child. Share the book together and encourage them to spot sounds or words that they will recognise.

We want children to love books and reading. Enjoy the opportunity to read together, visit the local library and take time to discuss what you have read together.



Numeracy and Maths in P2

We will continue to follow the Midlothian progression covering all aspects of Numeracy and Maths throughout the session. Alongside this we will be giving children the opportunities to explore number and maths in their play.

We will be using oral games, concrete materials, iPads, jotters, whiteboards and discussion to develop our understanding of concepts within these headings:

- Number Word Sequences and Numerals
- Place value and Number Structures
- Addition and Subtraction
- Multiplication and Division
- Fractions

Our Maths focuses for this session are Time, Shape and Information Handling.





Health and Wellbeing in P2

- Children are encouraged to talk about their emotions and the Zones of Regulation can help them to do this. Regular opportunities throughout the day are given for children to check-in.
- Resilience is referred to regularly as an important quality to develop. It is taught through assemblies, then modelled in class and encouraged as a way to navigate difficulties.
- Children will have one PE lesson with Mrs Marrins then build on these skills during two other PE slots in the week led by both P2 teachers.
- A restorative approach is used to help children manage disagreements with their friends.

Relationships and Sexual Health Programme will be used to cover topics such as friendship and our body.





Topic Work

Based on observations of the children's play, we are currently learning about different habitats (Rainforest and Oceans). Over the course of the year we will be covering:

- Science
- History
- Technology
- Expressive Arts
- RME

There are many ways to cover the curriculum and we aim to capitalise on the enthusiasms and interests of the children.


